- 3. Where was it written? From Rome where Paul was enduring his first imprisonment. This was where and when he also wrote Ephesians, Philippians, and Colossians. So, Philemon is considered one of the "Prison Epistles"
- **4.** Whom was it written to? A leader in the church at Colossae named Philemon
- **5.** Why was it written? To resolve a complicated and difficult problem between two brothers in Christ with grace and mercy. Philemon also serves as an example of reconciliation for Christians in generations to come.
- 6. What are the themes of this letter?
 - Equality
